

Update on Juno Beach Drainage Projects

Storm Water Drainage Project on Universe Boulevard is Complete!

The two most asked questions were: (1) Was it done on time? and (2) Was it done within budget?...and the answer to both questions was an emphatic Yes! This project was completed within the allotted time frame and was \$300.000 UNDER BUDGET as approved by the Juno Beach Town Council. This project went smoothly due to the knowledge and cooperation between the Town's staff and the general contractor, CK Contractors & Development. This capital improvement project was one of the largest, if not THE largest one to date in the history of Juno Beach. You may notice that there are many sections of the roadway that have been patched as a result of this drainage project. The Town's staff is working with the Town's engineer to determine a budgetary cost to repave the roadway in 2025. This proposed project will be added to the Capital Improvement Project (CIP) list which will be approved by the Town Council as the budget is developed for next year.

CELESTIAL WAY DRAINAGE PROJECT

The Town of Juno Beach was awarded funding from the Resilient Florida grant program to improve drainage on Celestial Way. This 50/50 match grant will provide \$162,000 towards this capital project. The majority of this project will create swales on both the east and west side of Ce-


lestial Way and install previous pavers at the intersection of Mercury Road and Celestial Way to further enhance the management of storm water. This project will be put out for competitive bid in March and construction will begin prior to July 1st per the grant guidelines.

OCEAN DRIVE DRAINAGE/ **PAVING PROJECT**

Palm Beach County is repaving Ocean Drive from US1 to Donald Ross

Road. This project will also provide enhanced drainage on Ocean Drive starting at the Juno Beach Town Center to just south of 751 Ocean Drive. The drainage features include new drainage pipes, catch basins and enhancing the existing swales. The County has also agreed to install two littoral shelves, on the north and south end of Pelican Lake to enhance the water quality. This is a Palm Beach County project, but the Town will fund the construction of the littoral shelf on the south end of the lake. This project should be advertised for a competitive bid in February or March by Palm Beach County.



TOWN OF JUNO BEACH FLOOD HAZARD INFORMATION

(Last Revised March 2024)

The Town of Juno Beach has applied through the Federal Emergency Management Association and received a 25% discount for Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA) and 10% discount for non-SFHA on Flood Insurance for Juno Beach property owners. During extended periods of heavy rainfall, some neighborhoods within the town are subject to flooding. Since you are in a flood hazard area, this information will address issues designed to protect you and reduce loss of value to your property as a result of floods.

[Notice to Floodplain Residents] FLOOD HAZARD

A flood hazard can occur when tropical storms, hurricanes or other heavy rainstorms occur. Although the Town has not experienced any major floods, the areas prone to flooding are: areas along US Hwy 1, Pelican Lake; coastal areas/ shoreline; and Inland bodies of water. If your property floods and you file two or more claims worth \$1,000 or more within any 10-yr period you are considered a "repetitive loss" property. Please contact the Town to discuss options to flood proof your property and ways to mitigate flood damage.

► PROTECT YOURSELF

Recognize the flood warning signals; when flood warnings are issued, it will be done by sirens and loudspeakers from police vehicles who will give evacuation routes. The main evacuation route will be US Hwy 1. Stay tuned to local TV or radio stations for information. Designate a meeting place with family/ friends if an evacuation does occur. To prevent drowning, do not drive or otherwise go into any flood waters. Sign up for instant messaging through Palm Beach County's Emergency Notification System www.alertpbc.com.

► PREPAREDNESS

The Town staff is here to assist you with Hurricane, Flood and Disaster Preparation. FEMA brochures are available to learn how to prepare and protect yourself and your property. Visit the Town Center for more information.

> FLOOD INSURANCE

The Town of Juno Beach is a barrier island and certain areas may be prone to flooding. Flooding is not covered by homeowners' insurance; a separate flood policy is necessary. Flood insurance is available through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). This insurance is backed by the Federal Government and FEMA. All property owners should contact their insurance agent to receive a quote and it is recommended that renters also have a policy to cover personal contents. Ask your insurance agent about a low-cost Preferred Risk Policy. Once flood insurance is obtained, there is a 30-day delay before the policy is in effect.

You can insure your residential property with flood insurance:

• \$250,000 for the building and \$100,000 for your contents.

For non-residential buildings you can *insure for up to:*

\$500,000 for the building and \$500,000 for your contents.

> PROPERTY PROTECTION

You can minimize damage to a structure with a few simple acts:

- · Store materials like sandbags, plywood, and plastic sheeting to protect your house from flood waters and to make quick repairs after a severe storm.
- Secure your home before leaving. Bring outdoor belongings (garbage cans/patio furniture) inside the house or tie them down securely. Move essential items and furniture to the upper floors; lock doors and windows.
- · Protect windows with storm shutters.
- Elevate the building and all electrical equipment above the flood level.
- Dry or wet flood-proofing the building to limit water damage and intrusion.
- · Redirect drainage away from the building.
- · Maintain storm drains and keep swales clear of debris.
- · Correct sewer back-up problems.
- · For information on retrofitting or flood proofing your structure to reduce the impact of flooding, call the Planning & Zoning Department at (561) 656-0306.

BUILD RESPONSIBLY

A permit is mandatory before you build or make structural improvements. Contact the Planning & Zoning Department at (561) 656-0306 prior to any construction activities or to report illegal floodplain development.

> PROTECT THE DRAINAGE SYSTEM

It is illegal for any solid, liquid or gaseous matter to enter the drainage system. Proper drainage will help reduce the risk of flooding. Town staff inspects the drainage system and removes blockages that are found or reported. If you live near Pelican Lake or other areas where waters flow, you can help in this process by keeping areas clear of debris. Reports of any violations should be made to the Code Compliance Dept. at (561) 627-0818.

PROTECT NATURAL FLOOD PLAN FUNCTIONS

Juno Hills Scrub site, 148 acres northwest of Donald Ross Road and U.S. Hwy 1 and 42 acres east of U.S. Hwy 1 and 341 acres southeast of Donald Ross and Ellison Wilson Road have been designated as Environmentally Sensitive Lands. These undisturbed natural areas of Juno Beach, act as a natural storage area for flood waters which reduce the possibility of flooding nearby residences and help to recharge our groundwater aquifer. Please help keep this area natural and beautiful by reporting any illegal dumping and littering violations to the Town at (561) 626-1122.



SEA TURTLE NESTING SEASON BEGINS: MARCH IST THROUGH OCTOBER 31ST

Please help protect nesting sea turtles and their hatchlings by eliminating and/or minimizing (to the extent possible) lighting that may be visible from the beach.

Beach Front Property Owners are required by State, County and Local Regulations to eliminate lighting visible from the beach in order to minimize potential impacts on adult female turtles and their hatchlings. This includes eliminating exterior lighting, ie. porch/patio lighting, pool lighting, security lighting, landscape lighting, etc., as well as potentially problematic indoor lighting-which may include lights that are located directly adjacent to windows and bright overhead light fixtures. Lighting that may not be eliminated must be shielded to the greatest extent possible to minimize the light that may be visible from the beach. Please also ensure that all beach chairs,



umbrellas, etc., are removed from the beach and dune daily as these can trap sea turtles as they attempt to nest! For more information, please contact Code Enforcement at (561)627-0818.

Protecting Our Waters From Stormwater Runoff

What is Stormwater Runoff?-

Stormwater runoff results when rain falls on surfaces that cannot absorb it (*like pavement or rooftops, or ground that is already saturated from rain*) and flows overland toward stormwater inlets, swales, ditches, canals, lakes, wetlands, or coastal waters.

Why is it a Pollution Problem?—

As stormwater runoff flows over land, it can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and carry these unwanted items into nearby waterways. Even if the runoff enters a stormwater system, much of it is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

Polluted stormwater runoff can have many adverse effects on plants, fish, animals, and people. Sediment can cloud the water and make it difficult or impossible for aquatic plants to grow. Sediment can also destroy aquatic habitats and harm organisms. Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die, they decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organisms can't exist in water with dissolved oxygen levels that are too low. Bacteria and other pathogens can wash into swimming areas and create health hazards, often making beach closures necessary.


What's it Got to do With ME?—

Most of the unwanted pollutants that end up on our waterbodies come from human activities. We litter. We throw or dump things into storm drains. We fail to pick up after our pets. We over-fertilize and over-water. We blow or sweep leaves and grass clippings into the streets and/or swales. These activities, and many more, result in personal pollution that you can help prevent!

Governing The Use of Dune Walkovers

ORDINANCE NO. 762

Effective: May 2023

SUMMARY: This ordinance addresses concerns about the use of bicycles, scooters, and skateboards on the Town's Beach Access Dune Walkovers. The narrow design of these walkovers, intended solely for pedestrian use, has led to safety hazards when non-pedestrian devices are introduced. In response to public health, safety concerns, and several received complaints the Council has decided to prohibit the use of bicycles on any portion of the Town's Beach Access Dune Walkovers.

Gas Leaf Blowers Prohibited

ORDINANCE NO. 768

Effective: October 1st 2024

SUMMARY: The use of gasoline-powered leaf blowers is prohibited within the Town. The decision is based on the noise and environmental pollution caused by these leaf blowers, emitting decibel levels of 70 to 100 and exhaust fumes containing harmful substances. The Council believes that this ban is in the best interest of public health, safety, and welfare.

Demolition Notification

ORDINANCE NO. 781

Effective: January 24th 2024

SUMMARY: Section 6-111. Demolition permits.

Each application for a complete or major demolition permit shall be subject to the following standards and conditions:

- (A) Existing native vegetation shall be preserved on site to the maximum extent practicable.
- (B) An erosion control plan, parking plan, construction screening plan, and truck logistics plan shall be submitted with the permit application.
- (C) The property owner shall submit an affidavit, in a format prescribed by the town, confirming that notice has been provided to the owners of all properties located within three hundred (300) feet of the property on which the demolition will occur at least thirty (30) days and no more than thirty (30) days prior to any demolition activities.
- (D) If construction does not commence within thirty (30) days after the demolition or a permit for reconstruction expires or otherwise becomes null and void, the property owner shall sod and irrigate the property within ten (10) business days to assure that the property will have a neat and clean landscaped appearance and will not be deemed a nuisance.
