Town of Juno Beach Awarded \$50,000 Grant For Kagan Park Improvements

From the DESK OF THE MAYOR

To All my Juno Beach Neighbors,

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as a member of the Town Council and thank you to my peers on Council for supporting me as Mayor of Juno Beach. As Mayor, I will work every day to preserve our Town's coastal character and way of life, and to bring excellence to government.

This will be a major transition year, a move towards an elected Mayor, a new Town Manager (Mr. David Dyess) starting on April 13th, Mrs. Marianne Hosta as our new council member, and of course the oversight and management of a multitude of new plans that will impact our quaint town.

There are three pillars upon which the future of the Town depends: (1) Local control over our future; (2) broad engagement by our citizens; and (3) transparency and responsiveness of government.

Local control, known as "Home Rule", is as it sounds, a town's abil-

ity to decide its own future. Juno Beach residents showed us they expect this as we had 76% of our town vote to elect our own Mayor earlier this month! Juno Beach is capable of thinking for itself and charting our own path. Yet, our town continues to face development and redevelopment pressures from outside agencies, federal and/or state government and large scale commercial developers from across the country. I will work every day to keep key decisions about the character of our town in the hands of our residents. Development is our single largest pressure point on our quality of life. As such, I am advocating that our local Planning and Zoning Board have the appropriate broad and meaningful authority to aide in the serious task of managing responsible growth while maintaining our coastal character and protection of our natural resources. My first

request as your Mayor is to return the site plan review powers to the Planning and Zoning Board.

Broad Engagement by Our Citizens: For Town government to be effective, it needs to hear all of our voices and I hope you all will become involved in the direction of our Town, whether through involvement in our public meetings, citizen initiatives to protect our environment, or other civic associations. It has been the dedication and foresight of our citizens – past and present – which has helped make Juno Beach the very special place that it is today. Please know that as your Mayor, I will always pay attention to your concerns and suggestions.

Transparency and Responsiveness of Government: Transparency of government is fundamental to building trust in government. Together with my fellow Council members, we will improve the responsiveness of Council and staff to all of your concerns and questions. My promise as Mayor is to work every day to restore, and build upon, your trust in our local government while working with our new Town Manager to provide full transparency to the decision making process.

Bianca and I, with our two sons, know how lucky we are to have found Juno Beach and to have you all as neighbors and friends. The Trust you have given to me will never be taken for granted. I look forward to serving as your Mayor.

old exercise equipment at the park. This will be the 3rd FRDAP grant, received by the Town in the last 17 years, used to renovate and improve Kagan Park. The primary funding element of the grant is for the fitness equipment with support funding for some minor landscaping.

Kagan Park not only offers our residents the fitness stations but other recreation and exercise options such as the bocci ball court and the basketball court. With 99% of the Juno Beach population over the age of 19 (U.S. Census bureau 2021) this new fitness equipment will provide our residents with fun and innovative ways to stay fit and healthy. The Town Council selected the vendor, Kompan, and they have thoughtfully presented specific pieces of equipment for the Town of Juno Beach. TOWN OF JUNO BEACH FLOOD HAZARD INFORMATION

(Last Revised March 2023)

*The Town of Juno Beach has applied through the Federal Emergency Management Association and received a 25% discount for Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA) and 10% discount for non-SFHA on **Flood Insurance for Juno Beach property owners**. During extended periods of heavy rainfall, some neighborhoods within the town are subject to flooding. Since you are in a flood hazard area, this information will address issues designed to protect you and reduce loss of value to your property as a result of floods.*

[Notice to Floodplain Residents]

► **FLOOD HAZARD**

A flood hazard can occur when tropical storms, hurricanes or other heavy rainstorms occur. Although the Town has not experienced any major floods, the areas prone to flooding are: areas along US Hwy 1, Pelican Lake; coastal areas/shoreline; and Inland bodies of water. If your property floods and you file two or more claims worth \$1,000 or more within any 10-yr period you are considered a “repetitive loss” property. Please contact the Town to discuss options to flood proof your property and ways to mitigate flood damage.

► **PROTECT YOURSELF**

A flood hazard can occur when tropical storms, hurricanes or other heavy rainstorms occur. Although the Town has not experienced any major floods, the areas prone to flooding are: areas along US Hwy 1, Pelican Lake; coastal areas/shoreline; and Inland bodies of water. If your property floods and you file two or more claims worth \$1,000 or more within any 10-yr period you are considered a “repetitive loss” property. Please contact the Town to discuss options to flood proof your property and ways to mitigate flood damage. www.alertpbc.com.

► **PREPAREDNESS**

The Town staff is here to assist you with Hurricane, Flood and Disaster Preparation. FEMA brochures are available to learn how to prepare and pro-

tect yourself and your property. Visit the town center for more information.

► **FLOOD INSURANCE**

The Town of Juno Beach is a barrier island and certain areas may be prone to flooding. Flooding is not covered by homeowners' insurance; a separate flood policy is necessary. Flood insurance is available through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). This insurance is backed by the Federal Government and FEMA. All property owners should contact their insurance agent to receive a quote and it is recommended that renters also have a policy to cover personal contents. Ask your insurance agent about a low-cost Preferred Risk Policy. Once flood insurance is obtained, there is a 30-day delay before the policy is in full force and effect.

You can insure your residential property with flood insurance:

- **\$250,000 for the building and \$100,000 for your contents.**

For non-residential buildings you can insure for up to:

- **\$500,000 for the building and \$500,000 for your contents.**

► **PROPERTY PROTECTION**

You can minimize damage to a structure with a few simple acts:

- ◆ Store materials like sandbags, plywood, and plastic sheeting to protect your house from flood waters and to make quick repairs after a severe storm.
- ◆ Secure your home before leaving. Bring outdoor belongings such as garbage cans and patio furniture inside the house or tie them down securely. Move essential items and furniture to the upper floors; lock doors and windows.
- ◆ Protect windows with storm shutters.
- ◆ Elevate the building and all electrical equipment above the flood level.
- ◆ Dry or wet flood-proofing the building to limit water damage and intrusion.
- ◆ Redirect drainage away from buildings.
- ◆ Maintain storm drains and keep swales clear of debris.
- ◆ Correct sewer back-up problems.

► **BUILD RESPONSIBLY**

A permit is mandatory before you build or make structural improvements. Contact the Planning & Zoning Department at (561) 656-0306 prior to any construction activities or to report illegal floodplain development.

► **PROTECT THE DRAINAGE SYSTEM**

It is illegal for any solid, liquid or gaseous matter to enter the drainage system. Proper drainage will help reduce the risk of flooding. Town staff inspects the drainage system and removes blockages that are found or reported. If you live near Pelican Lake or other areas where waters flow, you can help in this process by keeping areas clear of debris. Reports of any violations should be made to the Code Compliance Dept. at (561) 627-0818

► **PROTECT NATURAL FLOODPLAN FUNCTIONS**

Juno Hills Scrub site, 148 acres northwest of Donald Ross Road and U.S. Hwy 1 and 42 acres east of U.S. Hwy 1 and 341 acres southeast of Donald Ross and Ellison Wilson Road have been designated as Environmentally Sensitive Lands. These undisturbed natural areas of Juno Beach, act as a natural storage area for flood waters which reduce the possibility of flooding nearby residences and help to recharge our groundwater aquifer. Please help keep this area natural and beautiful by reporting any illegal dumping and littering violations to the Town at (561) 626-1122.

► **MAP DETERMINATIONS, ADDITIONAL INFORMATION**

The Town provides map determinations to let you know what flood zone you are in.

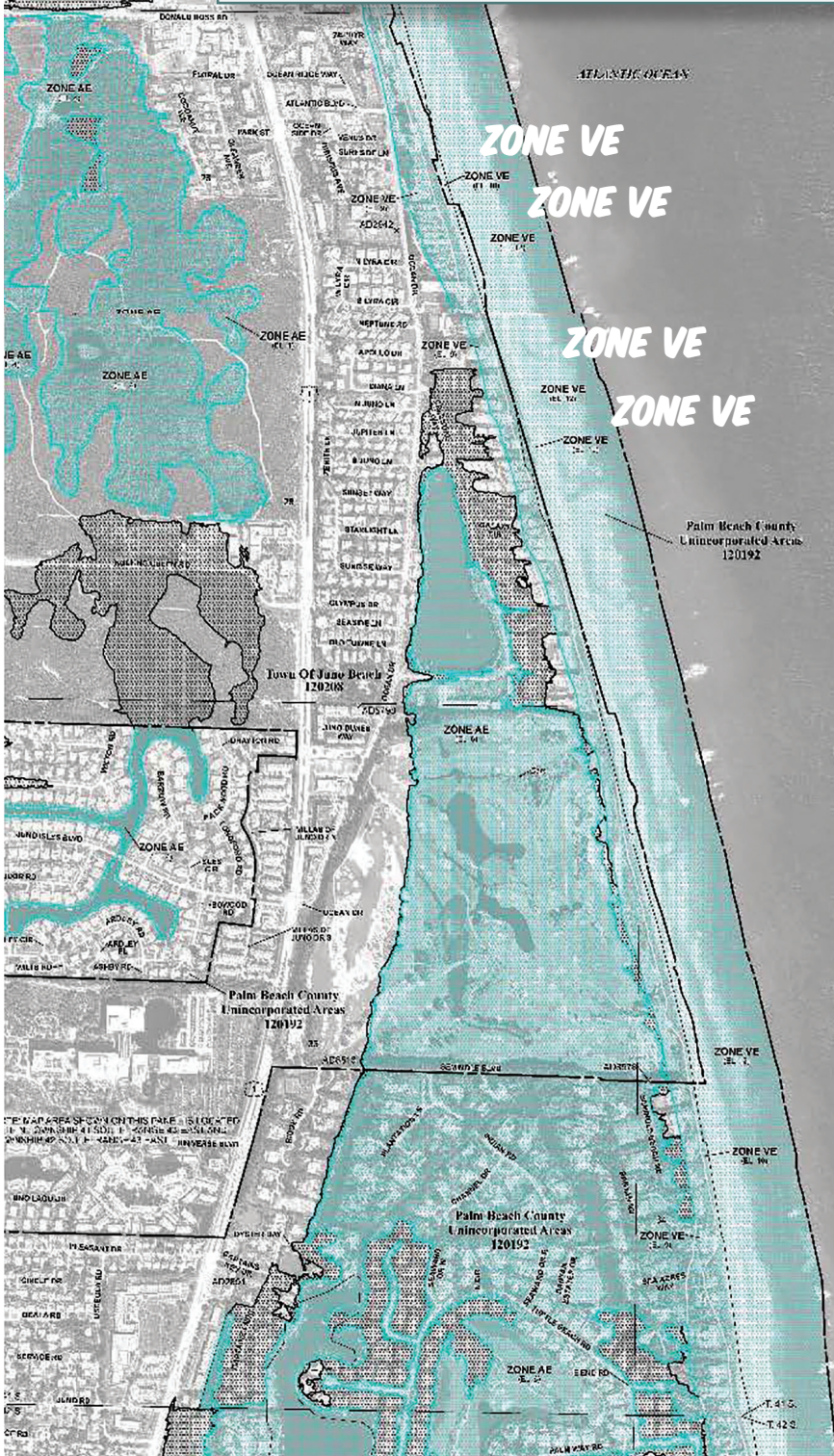

Sea Turtle Nesting Season

Sea Turtle Nesting Season began on March 1st and will continue through October 31st. Please help protect nesting sea turtles and their hatchlings by eliminating and/or minimizing to the extent possible lighting that may be visible from the beach!

Beach Front property owners are required by state, county, and local regulations to eliminate lighting visible from the beach in order to minimize potential impacts on adult female turtles and their hatchlings. This includes eliminating exterior lighting i.e. porch/patio lighting, pool lighting, security lighting, landscape lighting, etc., as well as potentially problematic indoor lighting which may include lights that are located directly adjacent to windows and bright overhead light fixtures. Lighting that may not be eliminated must be shielded to the greatest extent possible to minimize the light that may be visible from the beach.

Please also ensure that all beach chairs, umbrellas, etc. are removed from the beach and dune daily as these can trap sea turtles as they attempt to nest.

Amputation site was cleaned and debrided. Incision has good granulation beds (new tissue forming and filling in) and is healing.

ON THE WATERFRONT... Stormwater: Where It Flows, Everything Goes

STORMWATER SMART Construction In Your Neighborhood

When water from rain, snow, or sleet flows over the ground, it becomes "Stormwater." When Stormwater flows through a construction site, it can pick up sediment, oil, and chemicals and carry them downstream to local water bodies. That's why it's important for construction sites to protect the community by putting up special fences, barriers, and truck pads to prevent Pollution in our rivers, lakes, and streams.



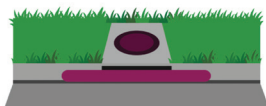
The Mud Stops Here

Construction entrances should have a pad that keeps mud off the street. Muddy tracks coming out of a site could mean chemicals, dust, and debris will be washed into the storm drain the next time it rains.



Good Fences Make Clean Neighbors

A fence or other barrier should be installed that keeps soil and construction debris from washing downstream from the site when it rains, especially sites on a slope or those with dirt piles.



Protect The Pipes

All storm drains near a construction site should have a protective barrier around them to prevent debris and muddy water from entering storm sewer pipes.

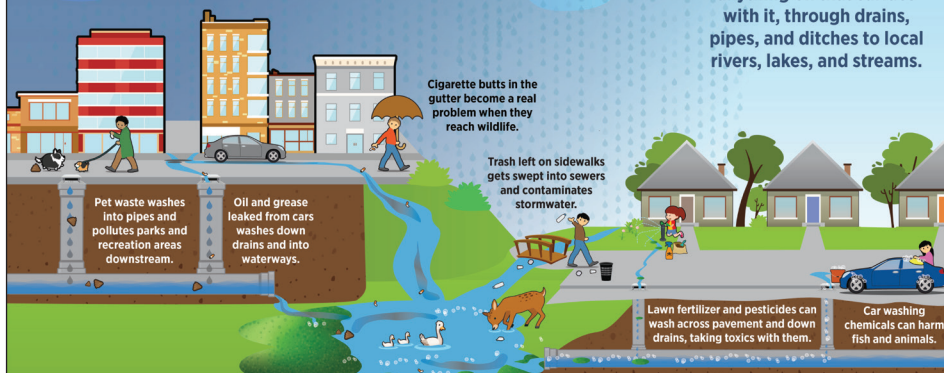


Something Look Wrong? Call!

If you see muddy water, chemicals, dirt, or any water that seems polluted flowing from a construction site in your neighborhood, call your local government office that handles construction permits.



When it rains, snows, or sleet, water hits hard surfaces and takes anything on that surface with it, through drains, pipes, and ditches to local rivers, lakes, and streams.

SIMPLE STEPS TO

Apply moderate amounts of water to create a healthy, drought- and stress-tolerant lawn. For most Florida soils, applying no more than three-quarters of an inch of water per application is enough to revitalize the grass. Use spray heads designed for planting beds. Position the sprinkler so that you water only the lawn and shrubs, not paved areas.

Equip hoses with automatic shutoff nozzles for car washing, hand watering, etc.



TEST

WITH TRACKS

Water your lawn and landscape only when it is actually needed, such as when footprints are left when you walk across the grass.



PLANT

FLORIDA-FRIENDLY LAWNS

Plant native or drought-tolerant vegetation that thrives in the native soil and local weather conditions. Go native, and resist the urge to water it and just let it go brown during the dry season. It will come back, as nature intended, when the rains come.



AVOID BUZZ CUTS

Cut your grass at the highest recommended height for your turf species or the highest setting on your lawn mower. Cut no more than one-third of the grass length at one time to encourage grass roots to grow deeper.

FERTILIZE RESPONSIBLY

Excessive nutrients flowing into our waterways do not only come from big industry or agriculture. The use of fertilizer and pesticides on our yards results in pollutants contaminating the waterways in stormwater runoff when it rains. Residents are encouraged not to use fertilizers or pesticides during the warmer months and to use them in the correct amounts during other times of the year.



INDOORS



COLOR YOUR WATER

Detect a leaking toilet by adding a few drops of food coloring to the tank. If the tank is leaking, color will appear in the bowl within 30 minutes. Replace the bad parts or consider upgrading to water-efficient toilets. Avoid flushing the toilet unnecessarily. Dispose of tissues, insects and other such waste in a trash can rather than in the toilet.



TURN IT OFF

Turn off the water while brushing your teeth or shaving.



TIME YOUR SHOWERS

By timing your showers to keep them under five minutes and installing low-flow shower heads, you can save water. The older the shower head, the more water it uses. New low-flow shower heads use only 2 gallons of water per minute or less. Older fixtures use as much as 5 gallons per minute.

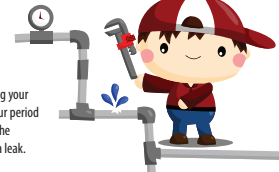
LOAD IT UP

Set clothes washing machines that have variable settings for water volume at the minimum amount required per load. If load size cannot be set, operate the washer with full loads only.



CHECK YOUR WATER METER

Check for leaking pipes by reading your meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the readings are different, you have a leak.

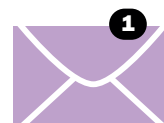
